survey methodology



N=900 Adults in California age 18 or older

Fielding conducted October 24–28, 2012


Random Digit Dialing (RDD) using live telephone interviewers calling both landlines and cell phones

Surveys conducted in both English and Spanish

Overall Margin of Error is ± 3.27%

key findings

just under a quarter of adults are aware October is domestic violence awareness month

know a family member





two beliefs about domestic violence stand out





Domestic violence can happen to anyone – men or women, young or old, any race, and any income level



Children exposed to domestic violence are more likely to have mental health and anger management problems




an overwhelming majority think domestic violence can happen to them






community services, outreach and training are seen as highly effective in reducing violence







youth education is seen as the most effective solution

children and safety are top priorities

(SAFE HOMES) All of our children should grow up experiencing safety in their homes and respect in relationships


(FREE OF VIOLENCE) Everyone has the right to live free of violence in their homes

(BREAK DV CYCLE) We all have a responsibility to help break the cycle of domestic violence by saying it is not acceptable, and that it needs to stop

(OVERCOME SILENCE) Too many victims of domestic violence are afraid to come forward and seek help. We have to overcome the silence, shame, and fear of domestic violence to help those in need and stop future abuse

(HEALTHY COMMUNITIES) We have to focus on building healthy relationships, families and communities


(PREVENTION) We need to do more to prevent domestic violence before it begins, address it early on if it occurs, and avoid it from escalating
